PASTOR'S THOUGHTS

The state of the s

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

There are a few times Jesus became frustrated, upset, and once very angry, as we read in God's Word in the Gospel of John, chapter 2, verses 13-16, when Jesus made a whip out of cords and overturned tables after chasing

those who were making the temple of worship into a marketplace.

Now please do not misinterpret this and think Jesus is saying the church shouldn't have baked good sales to raise money for a church ministry or when we have our annual church Christmas Bazar, or any other fund raising event. Our fundraising events are not to line our own pockets or grow our own businesses. They are all about God's "business" of seeking first the kingdom of God and making disciples of Christ.

With that clarified, just one more thing. Just because Jesus made a whip out of cords, chased people out of the temple who were doing the wrong business in the church, and overturned tables does not mean you can go to work or get home or at a restaurant or any other function and point to Jesus after getting arrested or losing your job or being asked to leave the premises.

Sometimes I wonder why I give such points of clarification as I just have in the two above paragraphs, but we humans sometimes need to not only have assurance of things we are doing when such lessons are given, but also warnings so as not to give the wrong instructions or implications. One example is when (in the Gospel of Mark 14:47-53) the disciple Peter tried to defend and save Jesus from being arrested, pulled out a sword and cut the arresting person's ear off. Jesus healed the man's ear and then rebuked his disciples for acting in the very opposite way he told them to.

If we counted how many times we were angered because of something happening in the world, something happening to us, something we've done, or as in the case of Peter, something happening to someone you love, then the list could fill pages and pages. If you could list the top 5 things that angered you the most, what would you write next each one about how you acted or responded? Did you implode, explode, or implode and then explode or even explode and then implode? Would there have been words thrown out that you wished you could take back? Hopefully nothing was thrown, and if so not at anyone but rather like a golf club that was lost into the little or large pond that only annoyed the fish and/or birds; the only cost to you was your cool and the cost of the club lost and the cost to replace it. There are ways in which anger can be expressed and released appropriately. Do we make mistakes? Sure! But it should never be at the cost of harming anyone else verbally (not only with yelling but also with gossip and words of malice) and, almost without needing to say, never at the cost of harming anyone physically.

God knows us all. God knows what we are feeling and thinking. God knows what we say under our breath as well as what we'd like to do if we had the power as well as none of the consequences. Yet God not only still loves us, God also calls us to overcome the desire and tendency to do that which is

harmful and I would even say evil; overcoming what's in you and well as what is thrown at your with good (Romans 12:21).

I share this because the most pain I see in the world, near and far, is from a person's harmful reaction or a group's hurtful or harmful actions. Our reactions to what hurts us can make the difference between a blessed life of grace, forgiveness and peace and a life that is terribly sad and filled with mercilessness (on others as well as oneself), as well as being unforgiving (again, of others as well as oneself) and filled with constant war and seeking revenge.

I remember when I was young and my friends and I were being bothered by someone who thought it was fun to pick on and even beat up those who were smaller or weaker than he was. I admit that for a while I learned on my own not only to defend myself but fight back. The day came and during a tough fight, I actually landed a punch squarely on his face and knocked "Goliath" down. It was as if I had taken down the evil troll of our school's playground. And if you're wondering where the teachers or school recess monitors were, the fight lasted less than a minute. We were only in elementary school. Well, let me end this story by saying that I knew he'd try fighting me again until he won. And that was no way to spend the rest of the school year. So I went up to him at the end of class, said I was sorry for knocking him out (yes, that's what I said), and I put my hand out as a gesture of peace. He shook my hand and that was the end of it. Though we played well on the playground from then on, I will be honest and say he never became a close friend. Sometimes it just doesn't end that way.

I'll end with saying God gives us the freedom to follow His ways. So you can choose to fight and fight, quarrel with those who want to quarrel with you, or you can stick out your hand. And even if the other person refuses to take your hand and attempts to fight more and more, see that Christ shows us another way. And that way, I'll be honest may look and feel like defeat for yourself, to the one you're in a fight with, and to those who may be witnesses. But know that Jesus is always 100% right. If that doesn't persuade you to be a person of peace and love, then I don't know what else would, because instead of fighting Christ allowed himself to be defeated so we could be saved.

May your life of grace, forgiveness, and peace in Jesus Christ not only bless you, but also bless and even save others close to you and distant from you.




